THE ART OF TRANSFORMATION

Transformation is about God being at the center of our life. Being a "better person" through performance is the opposite — man's ways are at the center.

We are reminded in both the old and new testaments:

Mark 10:18 "Why do you call me good?" Jesus answered. "No one is good – except God alone."

Isaiah 64:6 All of us have become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous acts are like filthy rags.

British Pastor Leonard Ravenhill (1907-1994) was an English Christian evangelist who focused on the subjects of prayer and revival. One of his most penetrating quotes is,

"Jesus did not come into the world to make bad men good. He came into the world to make dead men alive!"

Working hard to be a better version of ourselves is NOT transformation. It is quite the opposite, because the performance itself comes from us and is based in pride. Transformation comes from God.

Transformation comes out of surrender. No pride is left in our surrender. Dying to our own desires and allowing the Spirit of God within us to direct our mind, heart and actions is transformation.

The doctrines of justification and sanctification are critical to understanding transformation. These must be taught to our children, and of course we must first have these foundational truths in our own souls before instructing others.

Truth drives transformation.

Transparency drives the traction required for continual surrender to obey God, truly follow Jesus and experience moment by moment transformation. Gradually the old self dies and what is left is the Spirit of Christ in us. Our righteous acts are now empowered by the righteous one within us!

"So why do we still sin?" your child may ask. The answer is, FREE WILL! We get to choose to obey God or do what the flesh desires. We depend on the Spirit of Christ within us to win the battle of temptation...and this cycle of surrender continues until we take our last breath.

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TRACTION TIP



In leadership, striking a balance between fixing problems and prioritizing relationships is a skill that leaders must work on daily. In his book RARE Leadership, esteemed expert in neuroscience and relationships, Dr. E. James Wilder, stresses the significance of putting relationships first. He underscores that remaining relational is necessary for effective leadership, especially amid distress.

When issues overshadow relationships, the effects of focusing on solving them swiftly are damaging. A leader's arguments and justifications for a quick solution inadvertently erode relationships. Their brain switches and "sees people as problems to be solved and focuses on managing others to maximize winning." Those around the leader perceive this as an attack by their "enemy," and respond in one of three ways: defend, retreat, or shut down. Dr. Wilder describes the phenomenon of switching into "Enemy Mode" – when the lower brain puts problem-solving over preserving connections – as a counter to building a healthy, collaborative team.

Strong teams are built on the foundation of healthy relationships. Emotional maturity is the ability to prioritize the group's well-being over personal interests. He emphasizes the importance of learning to "switch back to Relational Mode as quickly as possible."

Prioritizing relationships in leadership is integral to team and organizational success. Leaders must recognize that conflicts and problems are natural within a group but need not relationships. Instead, these challenges can be opportunities to strengthen relationships, cultivate compassion, and drive collective success.
